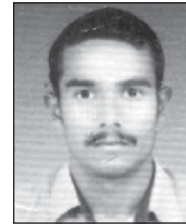

It has been accorded the status of a profession like any other helping professions and is practiced in a systematic and methodical manner. Social Work is being increasingly recognized as a core profession in the process of human and social development.

Social Work is almost required in keeping with the functions of the Modern Welfare State. Hence professionally trained and qualified Social Workers are increasingly in demand for holding responsible positions in government and non-government organizations working in the field of individual, family, community and social development.

ELIGIBILITY FOR M.S.W.

1. Graduation in any discipline from recognized University. Candidate appearing for final year examination whose results are awaited can also apply.

1. Candidates who have appeared for above examination are also eligible for admission but such admission will be provisional & it will be confirmed after passing the exam.
